

Mark Schneiders



Frank Garssen



Title: "Never let go"

Jos van Roosmalen is emeritus professor of Safe Motherhood and Health Systems at VU University Amsterdam and a retired consultant obstetrician (Leiden University Medical Centre). He published extensively on Safe Motherhood issues in low and high income countries and is a (co-) promoter of 25 Safe Motherhood theses, written by students of both the Northern and Southern hemisphere.

Among many credentials, he is founder of the Dutch Working Party for

International Safe Motherhood and Reproductive Health (since 1987), he was the Chairman of the Maternal Mortality Audit Committee of the Netherlands Society of Obstetrics and Gynaecology (2001–2016) and a co-founder of the International Network for Obstetric Survey Systems (INOSS) in 2010.

He was a board member of the Netherlands Society for Tropical Medicine and International Health (1992-1998) and acted as a technical advisor to the WHO for Maternal Near Miss (2015) and Maternal Sepsis (2016).

Currently, he works as a consultant for CCBRT Capacity building for emergency obstetric care in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania and for WLF's Maternity care project Thamini Uhai in Tanzania. Today he will speak about his reasons for opting a career in the Netherlands after working in low-income countries.

Jimmy Nelson

Title: "An homage to indigenous cultures"

Jimmy Nelson (1967) has worked for over thirty years as a photographer and is the initiator of the Jimmy Nelson Foundation.

Jimmy Nelson was born in Seven Oaks, the UK. At the age of 16, he was prescribed the wrong medication and lost all of his hair overnight. On the Jesuit boarding school he attended, his baldness was mistaken as a sign for right-wing affiliation. He became socially isolated.

Jimmy started his quest for a place where he would fit in as an 18-year old. His first choice was Tibet, where according to his own research, everybody was bald. This first trip set off a never-ending series of wanderings that continues to this day.

On his own search for self, Jimmy discovered the world's variety of peoples with their own cultures, looks and languages. He decided to pay homage to them by photographing the people he met on his travel. His work is characterized by its romantic and celebratory style.

Jimmy Nelson is now an award-winning photographer. He still cherishes the ambition to document indigenous cultures and leave visual heritage that will stand the test of time. He aims for his work to act as a catalyst for further discussion about the globalizing forces that put these cultures in peril. Today Jimmy Nelson will tell us about the valuable lesson he learned during his many encounters with other cultures.

Surgical Training Program, increasing surgical capacity by enhancing Medical Doctors and Community Health Officers to perform surgery in Sierra Leone.

Objective

To increase the level skilled health staff at district hospitals in Sierra Leone, whom can handle emergency surgical and obstetrical patients.

Goal

Train 60 Community Health Officers (CHOs) or Medical Doctor (MD) by 2019 and enable them to handle the most common surgical and obstetrical emergencies presenting at District Hospitals in Sierra Leone.

CapaCare's Surgical Training Program (STP) in Sierra Leone

CapaCare have in collaboration with the Sierra Leonean Ministry of Health and Sanitation (MOHS) started a postgraduate surgical training program (STP) for Medical Doctors and Community Health Officers training these cadres for 2 year each, using the WHO Integrated Management for Emergency & Essential Surgical Care as curriculum. A task shifting concept is applied to make more efficient use of available human resources for health.

Title: "Digging through the different surfaces"

Since 2011 Steven van de Vijver is the Director of Urban Health at the Amsterdam Institute for Global Health and Development. In addition he is involved with clinical work at the Family Medicine Department at the OLVG in Amsterdam and as a Senior Advisor at the Amsterdam Health Technology



Institute (AHTI). He is still associated with the African Population and Health Research Centre (APHRC) in Nairobi as a Senior Fellow/Ambassador. As the Chairman of the Support Group of the International Association of Dutch general practitioners (WHIG) he is leading innovative programs to support Family Medicine in low- and middle-income countries.

Steven did his medical training in The Netherlands and after specializing as a global health doctor he worked for Doctors without Borders in the Democratic Republic Congo. Back in The Netherlands he completed his specialisation in Family Medicine and a Masters in International Health in order to focus his medical career

on primary health care in slum settings. He obtained his PhD with a thesis on cardiovascular diseases prevention in the slums of Kenya. Besides his medical work he has written several books that have been translated in various languages.

Title: "Working for the ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Netherlands in the field of sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR)"

Ini Huijts is born in the Netherlands in 1959 and obtained her medical degree at the University of Amsterdam, and a Masters in Public Health in Developing Countries from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine. She works since 2001 for the Dutch Ministry of Foreign Affairs as Thematic Expert Health and Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights, since 2016 based in The Hague. She started in 1993 as Associate Professional Officer with the World Health Organisation and worked for a number of years each in Jamaica, Zambia, Ghana, Burkina Faso and Mali. Her focus has been on international health: infectious diseases, child health, health systems strengthening, policy dialogue, aid effectiveness, sexual and reproductive health and rights, health and SRHR in countries in crisis.

Seriana van den Berg is born in Seria Brunei in 1975 and raised in NYC and Haarlem. She graduated in medicine at the Leiden University in 2002. Later she did a master in Medical Anthropology & Sociology (2008) at the University of Amsterdam and a master in Public Health (2012) at Columbia University NYC.

She has worked for Eurotransplant, Médecins du Monde (Amsterdam, Darfur Sudan, Mayotte, Pakistan, Papua, Suriname) and has had various jobs as MD in the Netherlands (GGD, elderly care, internal medicine, psychiatry)

Since 2012 she has worked for the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, as policy officer at the WHO and UNAIDS and furthermore at the Multilateral Affairs Department and as Health Attaché Permanent Mission in Geneva. Title: "Rotation abroad"

Emanual Nuwass is a general surgeon and currently director of the Haydom Lutheran Hospital in Tanzania. He went to medical college in Tanzania and between 2007-2010 he worked as a medical doctor in Haydom. In 2014 he finished his specialisation as a general surgeon in Moshi and started working as a general surgeon in Haydom in 2015. The hospital in Haydom was founded in 1955 by Norwegian doctors and for a long time the Norwegians were managing the hospital. The past fifteen years this has shifted and the management and administration has transferred to Tanzanians. There have always been Dutch medical doctors as well and nowadays there is an intensive collaboration between Dutch global health doctors (in training) and Tanzanian doctors in Haydom. Emanual Nuwass will explain more about the rotation of the Dutch global health doctors in training in Haydom and about their role in the hospital.

Title: "Help, my partner wants to travel the world"

Mayke (35) studied medicine at Maastricht University and after working as a junior doctor at the gynaecology department for a couple of years she started the postgraduate programme Global Health. Jonas (38) studied economy at



Maastricht University and started in 2007 his own practice in marketing.

They left together for Haydom, Tanzania with their 10-month old daughter in august 2013. Both of them were contracted by Tweega Medica in collaboration with Haydom

Lutheran Hospital. Mayke worked in maternal care/ midwifery and Jonas started as crowd funding manager. However, after two months the hospital lost its director of finance and Jonas became board member of the hospital with responsibility for crowd funding, external relations and IT.

During their second year at the hospital, Mayke started the emergency department in the hospital, which did not exist yet.

They returned to the Netherlands after almost three years in Haydom. Nowadays Mayke is working at the emergency department of the Haaglanden Medical Centre and Jonas continued with his own practice.

Water Crash course By Henk Holtslag

Title: "Water crash course"

Henk Holtslag has an education as ships engineer and sailed on freighters and passenger ships for 8 years. He started working in Tanzania and Nicaragua via the organisation SNV in 1974 and now he has 25 years of experience as development worker in 16 countries in Latin America, Asia and Africa.

After some failed projects due to over expensive and too complicated technology, he invented SMARTechts. These are simple and low-cost technologies involving water and sanitation, for example water filters, manual well drilling and rope pumps, all locally produced in many countries.



He is now a freelance consultant in this area and focuses on local production since twenty years. He works for several organisations in fifteen countries and trains locals and NGO's. His slogan is "if it can be produced locally, then it can also be repaired locally." His worked resulted in sustainable access to water and sanitation for over half a million people in Africa, based on his techniques that can be continued independently by the communities after training.

His dream is water, sanitation and nutrition available for everybody worldwide.

His motto: no fish but a fishing rod and the knowledge to make that rod.
